Why I Love the Big Book

It recently came to my attention that I rely on words from the Big Book of Alcoholics Anonymous to communicate...more each year in fact. And that feels worthy of a few more words, in my humble opinion.

I could probably write two more articles on this topic, but I will be brief. The top 6 pages references that first come to mind are enough for now: Pages 38, 417, 129, 83-86, 552, 568. These pages are from the 4th Edition of <u>Alcoholics Anonymous</u>.

When I first came into AA meetings, I remember one fellow who was constantly quoting pages. He would talk briefly, then always end with prescribing that I "**read page such-n-such**". I would go home and read that page... he got my curiosity up. I later learned that he just pulled a number from out of his head for no particular reason: it got people reading the Big Book! I had to laugh at myself... because it worked.

- → The very first time I read anything that got my attention was the story about the jaywalker. That "foolish chap having queer ideas about fun" actually described my insane desire to continue to drink, despite the progressively horrific consequences. That's on page 38
- → Again, my first reading of page 417 about acceptance has been the most meaningful paragraph of my sobriety. I quote it more often than any other. It explains the best way I know of achieving any kind of peace of mind and contentment: by staying focused on 'the log in my eye and not the splinter in yours' as one friend described it. "Acceptance is the answer to all my problems today...Nothing, absolutely nothing happens in God's world by mistake." This also helps me to let go
- → Then there is the true essence of how Alcoholics Anonymous works for me, described on page 129, by that old goldminer. He suddenly realizes that his pick has struck an endless supply of gold but it's only available to him if he "mines it for the rest of his life and insists on giving away the entire product." I can't give away what I don't have. That's another way of saying that I cannot stay still in AA, I must keep moving forward or pay the price of not doing so. One more 2x4 between my eyes, and one more lesson

➔ Discussing favorite passages in the Big Book wouldn't be complete without reference to the Promises on pages 83-86. I've heard sponsors tell sponsees to read those 3 pages every single day, to good effect. Reading to page 88 is also recommended.

→ The Chapter called Freedom From Bondage worked wonders for me on a trip with my husband a few years back. I had just heard at a meeting that someone read that chapter every single week of his sobriety; that impressed me. During our 12-hour drive across Canada something happened to create such irritability in my mind, that by the time we reached the hotel I was furious. I recalled that chapter, so I immediately locked myself in the bathroom to read Freedom From Bondage. By the time I opened the door, I couldn't remember why I was so angry. It was miraculous.

➔ And finally, I am so fond of Herbert Spencer's quote on page 568. I will end this by encouraging you all to "read page 568" and see what you think. This helps me to overcome fear.

TRADITION EIGHT CHECKLIST

- 2. When I chafe about any Tradition, do I realize how it affects others?
- 3. Do I sometimes try to get *some* reward ~ even if not money ~ for my personal AA efforts?
- 4. Do I try to sound in AA like an expert on alcoholism? On recovery? On medicine? On sociology? On AA itself? On psychology? On spiritual matters? Or, heaven help me, even on *humility*?
- 5. Do I make an effort to understand what AA employees do? What workers in other alcoholism agencies do? Can I distinguish clearly among them?
- 6. On my own AA life, have I any experiences which illustrate the wisdom of this Tradition?
- 7. Have I paid enough attention to the book Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions? To the pamphlet AA Tradition ~ How it Developed?
- **Heard at Meetings:** "I asked my sponsor to tell about God. He looked at me kindly and said, "All you need to know about God is this: You are the problem, and God is the solution.

PRINCIPLE OF STEP 8: BROTHERLY LOVE

Brotherly: of or like a brother: displaying characteristics of a brother, such as loyalty or steady affection.

Love: a powerful emotion felt for another person manifesting itself in deep affection, devotion or sexual desire. God's regard for his creatures. Charity (the virtue)

I didn't think Webster's would be of help this time – wrong – it is. God's participation in the wording of our literature continues to be appreciated. Also, how refreshingly lovely to see sexual desire presented here as an expression of love.

I see the WE of AA's mission in the words. "loyalty or steady affection" and love for another showing up as "devotion", with God's regard for all of us being our ultimate power source to accomplish our mission.

Our Twelve and Twelve says, "learning how to live in the greatest place, partnership, and brotherhood with all men and women, of whatever description, is a moving and fascinating adventure.

I know I certainly experienced "Sisterly Love" (couldn't resist) last week at a women's meeting where I shared my pain with very little editing. Cried, swore and even admitted I didn't trust God these days. I sensed no judgment, nor anyone wanting to box, label, or correct me. What a gift to experience safety in one of our rooms to be at the level of vulnerability and exposure.

I cringe when I think of the times I was a self-appointed member attempting to create a level of control which demanded we must all be one in a row of ducks. I know now that I'm not the AA police nor do I want the job, and some of us are. Geez.

"The first, and one of the most difficult, has to do with forgiveness." (Quote from our 12 & 12, referring to obstacles). This sure is a key to Brotherly Love. I see how impossible this level of love is without forgiving others which I believe sets me free to forgiving myself.

Brotherly Love is a tall order. How wonderful we get to experience progress not perfection.

NEGLECT, THE ELEPHANT IN THE ROOM

When we are satisfied that we have given Steps one through five our best effort and have identified the most glaring defects of character and shortcomings, it's now time to affect the changes in the most obvious of our faulty thoughts and the behaviours that stem from those thoughts by addressing them in **Steps six and seven**.

To be successful in this endeavor, we must first get honest with ourselves and begin to *establish* some credibility and by that, I mean *always* doing the things we say we are going to do. We bring most of the basic flaws out in the open as we become aware of them. Then, if we are sure that we are committed to the Program, we will want to set, in place, principles to live by that cut off our own escape when we stumble and want to revert to that old way of thinking. Most of us do this with the help of a sponsor or a mentor, if you like, and go by the Book as best we can.

I did, what I thought was a thorough job of it, then one day, about twenty years ago, I was trying to park my car in a somewhat crowded parking lot and as I found the spot I wanted there was a shopping cart blocking my way. I got out of my car and moved the cart aside, then parked my car. I then got that shopping cart and pushed it back to the store entrance, then went about my business.

From that day on, when parking at any market, I search for a stray shopping cart and take it back to the store just to make up for all the times I shoved one into the flower bed and drove away.

After telling that story at meetings over the years, I hear people telling how it is very uncomfortable for them to leave the cart adrift in the parking lot, and we all get a big laugh out of it. As best I can tell, the word *neglect* is only mentioned two times in the Big Book (pg. 97 & 129) and two times in the 12 & 12 (pg. 81 & 151). And seldom, if ever, has it been the topic of a meeting that I can recall. It is like the proverbial, *elephant in the room*.

As I started to catch myself shirking my responsibilities, it became obvious to me that if I wanted to regain some form of self-respect and dignity, I was going to have to put the word *Neglect* on my list of shortcomings and *question my integrity*. Do I do what is right even when there's no one watching? If credibility is, *always doing what I say I'm going to do, then Integrity*, to me, is *a whole bunch of credibility*.

To cut off my own escape I do routine things every day, that cost me nothing and the result of that is a clear conscience. If I am doing the little things that I should, I find it much easier to give the big things that same sort of attention. I pick up after myself, I never walk away from my bed in the morning without making it, and I liken that to being an unspoken prayer saying, I will be responsible, I will be orderly, I will be neat and I will not be neglectful, I will be respectful, I will stay on the unselfish side of the ledger in all of my decisions, I sometimes revisit those pages in the Big Book and the 12 & 12 and I try my best not to ignore the elephant in the room.Rick R. ... borrowed from The San Diego AA

CONCEPT VIII

"The Trustees are the principal planners and administrators of overall policy and finance. They have custodial oversight of the separately incorporated and constantly active services, exercising this through their ability to elect all directors of these entities."

I couldn't understand this Concept on a corporate level per say, so I broke it down to something I think I can understand.

The General Service Board's job is to make sure the house of AA (*as set down by the rules made by AA members*) keeps to these rules and within the budget they are given by us ("by *own donations"*).

The other part of the General Service Board's job is to make sure the World Service Office and the Grapevine, which are run as separate businesses, keep within their own budget but maintain the rules set by AA (*us, the members*) and the policies we set down.

Therefore, the World Service Office and the Grapevine are businesses run separately from the General Service Board so that the Board can oversee AA.

IS YOUR GROUP LINKED TO AA AS A WHOLE?

Part one

Most Groups in the United States and Canada choose to be linked to AA, as a whole, by listing the Group with the General Service Office (G.S.O.) as well as with the Area Assembly, District and local Central/Intergroup office.

Groups listed with G.S.O. have either General Service Representatives (G.S.R.s) or "Group contacts," who act as channels for two-way information and shared experience. Once a Group is listed with G.S.O., the Group information is shared with the Area Assembly via the Delegate. Group information may be first received by the Area, which then shares the information with G.S.O.

What 's the point? Each Group linked to the local General Service structure is automatically a part of the "Group conscience" of AA in Canada and the US through their G.S.R.s participation in District meetings and Area Assembly. Each GSR communicates his or her Group's "conscience" on important matters of policy considered by the District and Area Assembly. During the Annual General Service Conference, the Area's Groups are represented by their elected Delegate. Groups in our listings are included in the **confidential** domestic directories published annually, which provide contact information for traveling AA members.

New Groups listed with the General Service Office are assigned an identifying service number (ID), receive a "Group Handbook" (through their GSR or Group contact), and are included in mailing sent to all listed AA Groups. For instance, Groups receive our quarterly newsletter **Box 4-5-9** that keeps them informed on policies being considered by the Conference, changes to AA literature, and when and where their Regional Forums will be held (Forums are weekend gatherings where current experience is shared). Additionally, GSRs or Group contacts for listed Groups receive registration details for each International Convention, held every five (5) years.

How? To participate in services provided by GSO to AA Groups, it is vital to furnish simple information to GSO through the **Alcoholics Anonymous New Group Form.** To notify GSO when Group information changes, i.e. the Group contact or GSR moves or resigns, and a new GSR or contact is elected, or when there is a change in the Group's location or meeting day(s) and time, please use the **Alcoholics Anonymous Group Information Change Form.** Group changes should also be given to the Area registrar/secretary, to the District Committee Member (DCM) and to the local Intergroup/Central Office. ...to be continued SMF-104


